Been There, Done That

At least one member of the Department of Economics, Finance & International Business must be muttering "déjà vu" over and over after reading the recent "Special Report" on George Carter's new "Literature Presence" reach. To us, not only does the whole episode reek of "Handbook violation," it would be problematic even if it were legitimately being considered for inclusion in *Enhancing Faculty Productivity*. For instance, with what we are told is a scale with just three categories, little useful information is gleaned from the new evaluation category. Isn't it interesting that, at the same time Carter is finding his "Literature Presence" religion, it is being reported that Barry Babin is arguing for Proceedings to count the same as B-level journal articles. Talk about two units moving in opposite directions. At least Babin is trying, though perhaps in the wrong way, to represent the faculty in his department. Carter, on the other hand, seems to be representing the misguided interests of Doty and a faction of others in the CoB. "Dr. *déjà vu*" must be wondering who is in Carter's crosshairs.
